### THE OLD-TIME GROCER

Before the advent of the supermarket the grocer was of the 'old school'. Personal service was a premium.

The grocer had served on the Western Front. He had seen suffering, poverty and sacrifice in the Depression and the drought years.

He was generous with credit, knowing he would be repaid when the seasons improved. Neither did he neglect his family. His children were sent away to study at considerable personal sacrifice. One became an architect, another was a teacher who encouraged science learning for girls. One returned to assist him in the business. An added bonus for the community was that, as a talented musician, she played the organ in the local church and led the choir.

Sometimes, if you had a large order, the grocer would invite you to come into his office for a cuppa, biscuit and a chat, while your order was being looked out, packed in a cardboard carton, and placed in your car. Orders were delivered regularly to the elderly and sick.

He was a proud. Always neat in shirt and tie, sleeves rolled up, he was there to serve the customer with his special attention. Not a bad example for us now, as neighbours, friends, parents and community.

Jesus, was never above the people at any time. He said "I am among you as one who serves."
